A Note from the President

I have recently heard accounts of people, I know on a casual basis that made me realize, what we see on the exterior, is not what they carry within. This is not a new revelation. But it came back to me when recent situations came to light. It is easy to believe that the lot we carry is hard, then we see what challenges others have and suddenly my life is much better than I realized. One of the lessons my Mom left me with is to believe that "All Will Be Well." Mom had a deep trust in God and knew that God would provide. She wasn't naive, she had seen hardships - she left for America with my Dad, three small children and expecting another in less than three months, with 3 gold coins to her name - but she never lost Hope.

Hope at times is difficult to cling to. Pain, grief and broken relationships can make hope seem distant. When we experience injustice or face difficulty, we tend to focus on what is broken rather than looking for the good around us. Hope requires patience and that waiting can be exhausting. This is difficult for all of us but often students have a hard time because they have less life experiences.

Hope does not mean denying reality. Hope challenges us to accept our brokenness. The Japanese believe that every piece of art should contain some type of imperfection. Imperfection adds to the beauty of the piece.

Hoping, in fact, is not a mere act of optimism, like when we sometimes hope to pass an exam ("Let's hope we make it") or when we hope for good weather for the trip out of town on a Sunday in the spring ("Let's hope for good weather"). No, hoping is waiting for something that has already been given to us: God's love. But like any gift, hope needs to be accepted and cultivated. If given a seed as a gift, it will die unless it is watered and nurtured. If we have a musical gift, we must practice or we will never advance as a musician.

At school, hope has been the focus of our Lenten reflections. It is our prayer that the abiding hope of Jesus remains with all of us. This does not end because Lent is drawing to a close. There are less than 10 weeks left in the 2025-2026 school year. May we take advantage of this time to nurture hope in one another.

Learning About Business

Thinking of one day owning your own business, possibly majoring in business or just want to know more about how businesses are run? If so, check out this amazing opportunity.

Learning About Business (LAB) is a nonprofit organization that runs a week-long summer camp for high school sophomores, juniors and seniors to learn the basics of running a business from both the corporate and entrepreneurial perspectives. This total immersion, interactive business experience will be held on the campus of Lake Erie College in Painesville, from Sunday, June 8th through Friday, June 13th, 2025.

Local business leaders and professionals act as presenters and resources, guiding the students through six days of intense hands-on learning, competition and personal growth. Students are grouped into teams to develop and run a virtual online company - applying the lessons learned throughout the day to executive level decisions that impact their company's market share.

Students of LAB Week 2025 will earn THREE college credits for their participation in the program. Learning About Business and Lake Erie College (LEC) have partnered to offer credit for LEC's Fundamentals of the Enterprise as transferable credits to any college or university. Students who successfully complete LAB Week are also eligible for a \$4,000 scholarship should they decide to attend Lake Erie College.

Additionally, students have the opportunity to improve soft skills like interpersonal communications, strategic thinking, creative problem solving, and leadership. By the end of the week, students learn not only the basics of running a business, but also gain valuable employability skills which will give them an advantage during future job interviews.

The cost of the camp for students is only \$350 that includes room, board and materials. No qualified student is turned away, full scholarships are available for those with financial need. And new this year, we will be offering an opportunity for students to apply for a merit scholarship.

There are applications in the Guidance Office. Learning About Business has been awarded a generous grant from the Ashtabula Foundation to cover the cost of four students from Ashtabula County to participate in LAB Week 2025.


